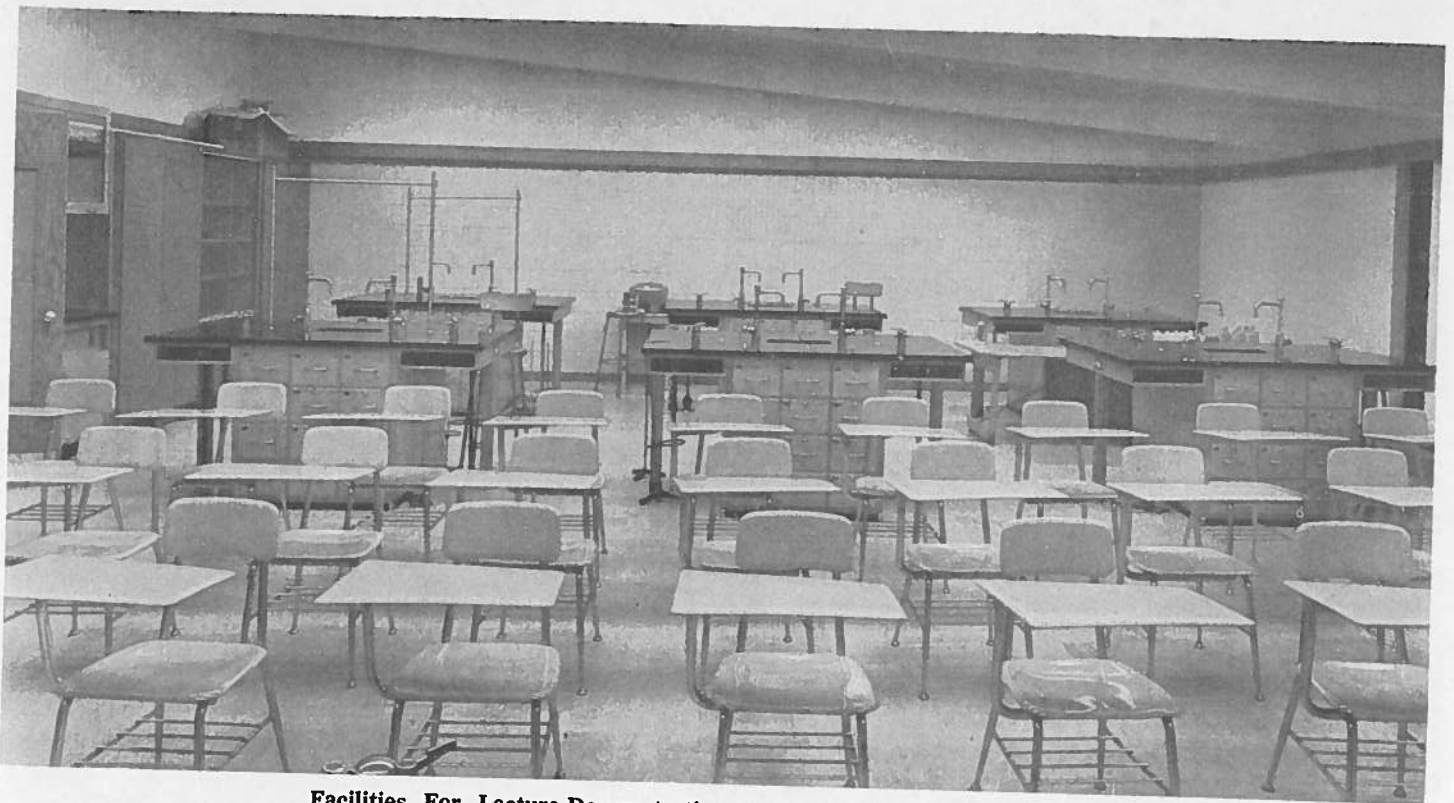

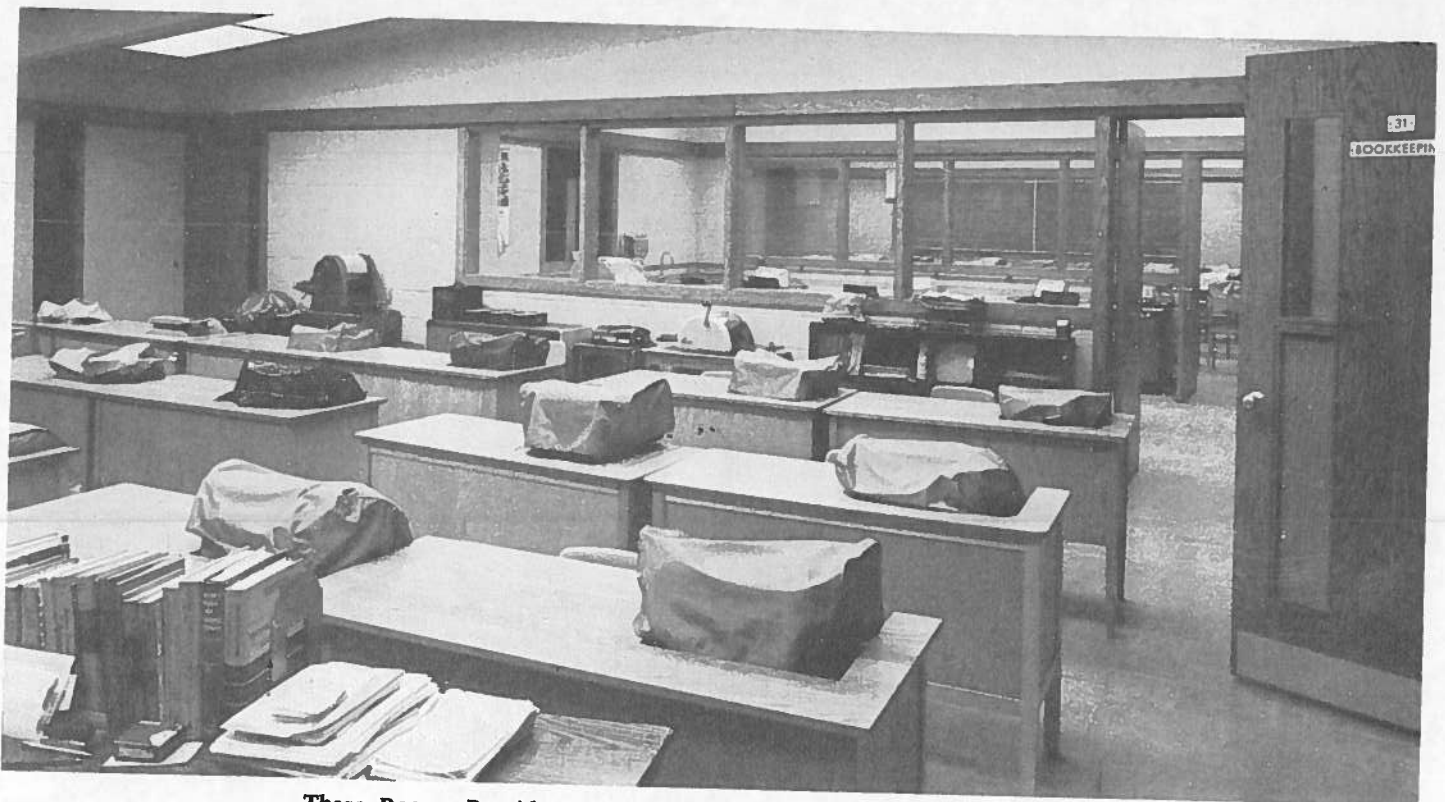
Rudolph A. Meyer

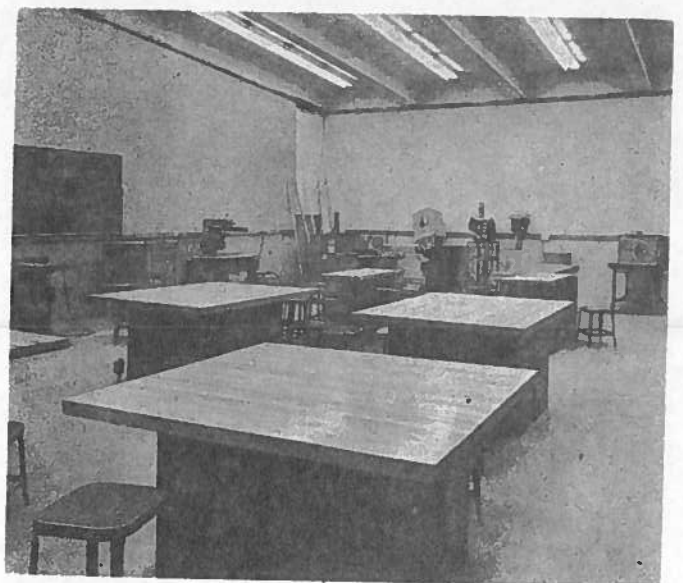
The Long Centrally Located Hallway Is Not Only Attractive But Functional In Providing Access To All Rooms.



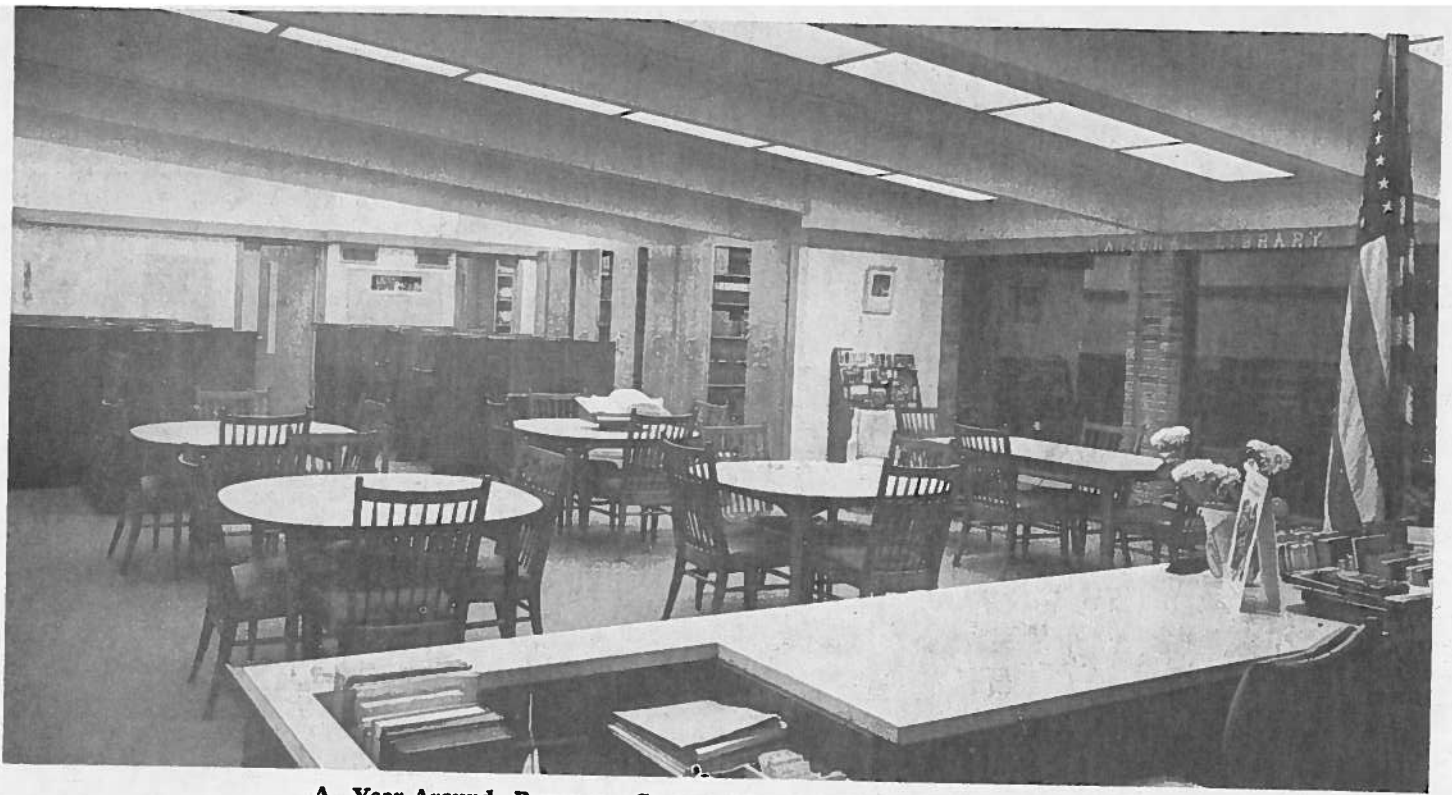
A Movable Wall Permits These Two Classrooms To Become One For Large Group Instruction.



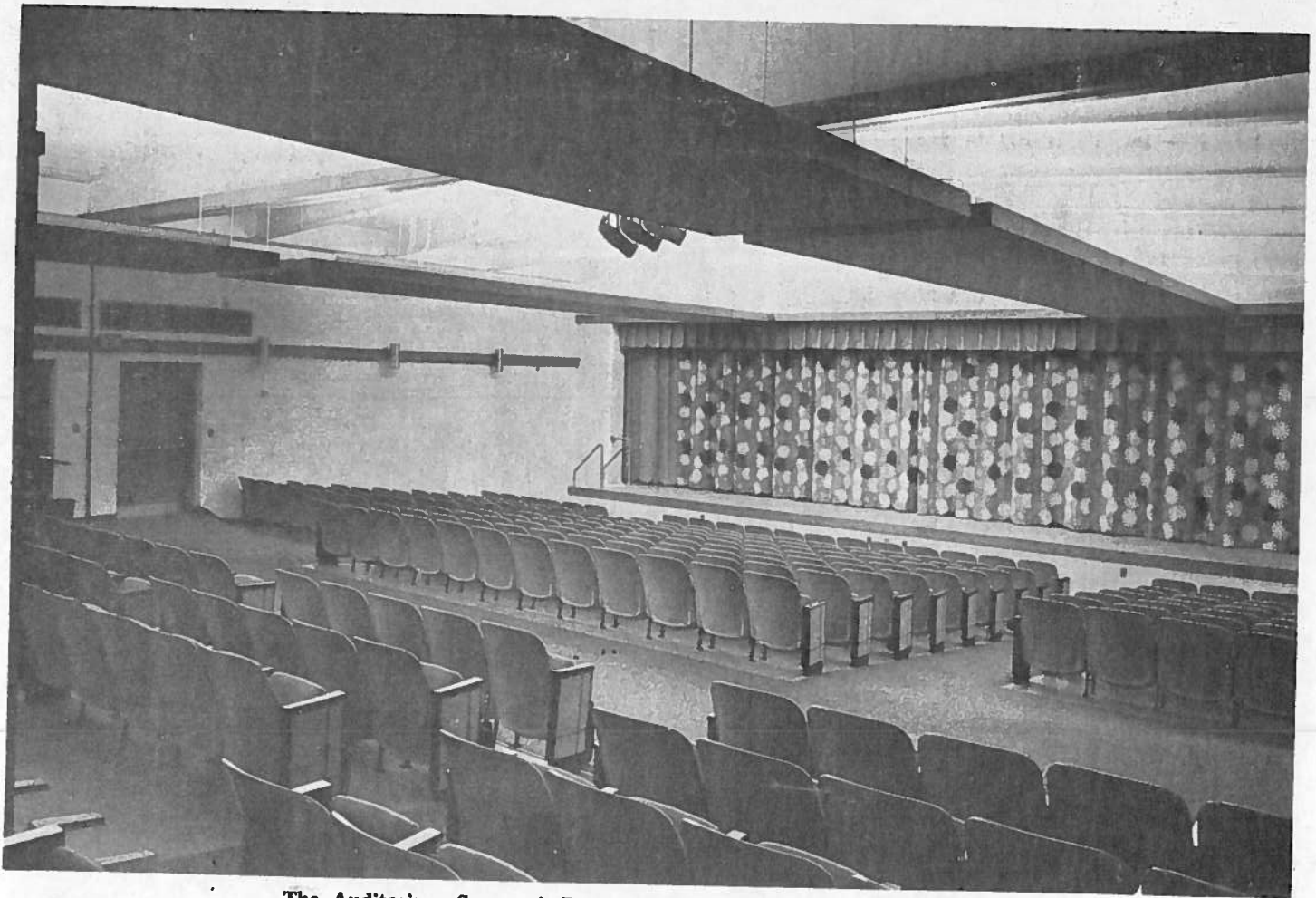
The Office Area Provides The Necessary Administrative Procedures For Running A Modern School.
