Looking Towards the Future

Greetings Melrose-Mindoro Community,

As we say goodbye to 2021, I hope everyone is off to a Happy New Year! As the school district starts off 2022, I would like to take a moment to update you on a few items of emphasis for the next few years.

For the past six years, the district strategically focused their efforts and resources on updating and improving the school buildings and facilities. Last year, the district completed the final projects associated with the building referendum that was passed in November of 2016. The school board and community wisely took advantage of historically low interest rates and building and labor costs to complete the beautiful Melrose-Mindoro united campus. The new modern and spacious facility has been crucial in helping the district adjust to the many challenges created by the COVID-19 health pandemic, and will serve the community for many years to come.

For the next few years, the district will focus their resources on staffing and educational programming to provide additional support for students, parents, and teachers. The district will focus on several key areas: classroom support, before and after school programming, summer school programming, mental health services, and educational technology.

The district has already added, or has committed to add, the following positions to support our students, parents, and teachers:

- *An additional 2nd Grade Teacher to reduce class sizes to 15-16 students
- *A Title I Math Teacher to provide additional support for elementary students
- *A Behavior Interventionist to provide additional support for students and teachers in the classroom
- *A Jr. High School Counselor to provide guidance and mental health support for our junior high students
- *A part-time School Psychologist to help provide additional mental health support for students
- *Technology Education Assistant
- *Before and After School Program Coordinator
- *After School and Summer School Tutors
- *Additional staff hours for extended Library hours during the 2022-2023 school year
- *Additional staff hours for summer Library hours
- *On site counseling services available to students and parents

In addition, the Melrose-Mindoro School District, like many schools across the state of Wisconsin, are facing historic teacher shortages. Significantly fewer students are pursuing education as a career, and Wisconsin districts are reporting increasingly shallow applicant pools for a variety of positions. Certain disciplines, such as Math, Science, Technology Education, and Agriculture Education, are at critical shortage levels. Addressing these shortages, while attracting, developing, and retaining top talent, is one of the district's most important issues facing our future.

Finally, words cannot express how proud I am of our students, staff, parents, and communities! Every day I get the opportunity to see your children work hard, grow, be challenged, and have fun. Every day I see a committed and passionate group of employees who are overcoming the many challenges of the past several years and accomplishing great things with our students. I am truly thankful to be part of this amazing school district. Thank you!

Again, thank you for taking the time to read our newsletter and your continued support of our schools.

Regular Open Enrollment: February 7-April 29, 2022

Wisconsin's inter-district public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend school districts other than the one in which they live. Applications may be submitted to up to three nonresident school districts.

The application period for the 2022-2023 school year is from February 7-April 29, 2022. **The application period closes at 4:00 p.m. on April 29, 2022.** Parents are encouraged to apply online at: http://dpi.wi.gov/oe

Once a pupil is accepted into a nonresident school district, the pupil may continue to attend that district without reapplication except that: A pupil may be returned to the resident school district if the special education required in a new or revised IEP is not available in the nonresident district or there is no space, or a pupil who has become habitually truant in the nonresident district may be returned to the resident district.

It's Cold Outside! Winter gear is necessary for warm, happy, healthy students. We have a supply of donated coats, hats, mittens, scarves, and snow pants. If your child is in need of warm clothing, please let a staff person know. If we do not have what your child needs, we will help find it. Students will have outside recess unless air or wind chill temperatures are zero or below as posted on the National Weather Service. This is monitored closely during the cold winter days.

REMINDER OF CRITERIA FOR KEEPING A STUDENT HOME FROM SCHOOL:

Temperature over 100* by mouth/ear. Please do not send the student back to school until the temperature is normal for 24 hours without the use of a fever-reducing medication.

Severe cold with headache, chills, fever and stuffy or runny nose

Vomiting in the past 24 hours

A red sore throat with white spots, lasting more than 12 hours

An undiagnosed rash

Red blood streaked eyes that are mattered shut, itch, swollen and hurt.

Diarrhea in the past 24 hours

Live head lice - may come after treated

COVID symptoms - One of the following: cough, new loss of sense of taste or smell, shortness of breath/difficulty breathing OR Two of the following: Diarrhea/nausea/vomiting, fever, congestion/runny nose, headache/body aches, sore throat, extreme fatigue.

If your student is not going to be attending school, please call (608) 488- 2201 or email the secretary at attendance@mel-min.k12.wi.us to let them know of the absence and the reason. Please also let your bus driver know.

COVID:

- We have free testing on site Mondays and Wednesdays from 7:30 am to 11:30 am and Fridays from 7:30 am to 3:30 pm. Testing is open to anyone that lives in the household with a student or staff member. It is a NON Public Testing Site. If you would like to utilize this testing service, please register at register.covidconnect.wi.gov. No appointments necessary.
- Any symptom (listed above under Covid symptoms) warrants a test or to stay out of school for a minimum of five days
 followed by five days of masking at school. If having to be reminded to wear a mask, student will be sent home through
 day 10.
- If a student is symptomatic (whether a close contact, vaccinated or neither) a test will be recommended, he or she may return to school if the rapid test is negative. If testing is not chosen, see second bullet point.
- **Positive case:** please notify the school as soon as possible, so we can begin to identify the close contacts. Student will be out of school for **five days** from **test date**, he/she may return to school on day six, a mask is required through day **10**. If having to be reminded to wear a mask, student will be sent home through day 10.
- A close contact at school is anyone within three feet of the positive case for more than 15 minutes within a 24 hour period.

ATHLETES:

A vaccinated athlete may practice and play through his/her 10 days.

A non-vaccinated athlete is required to test on day three AND day five from last known exposure, per Dairyland Conference. With negative tests those morning, the athlete can compete in games. No competition allowed until first negative test on day three, per Dairyland Conference.

A positive athlete is required to be cleared by a MD, DO, NP, or PA prior to returning to practice or games.

HEAD LICE: If you have a concern about your child, let me know and I will discreetly check them. They do not jump or fly and do not like to leave the head they are on - unless they can move directly to another. If your child has long hair, please style it pulled back or up. When the children put their heads together working on projects, telling secrets, etc., the lice have the opportunity to move to another head. Occasionally check your child after their bath or shower. If you have found head lice at home, please let me know, along with any other students that your child is in close contact with. This is kept confidential. You can find our complete head lice policy and treatment information on the school website.

HEALTH SCREENS: Vision: I continue to do vision screens on students at parent or staffs request. Hearing: Our school district has an Audio Pilot screener that can be used to screen the hearing of any child that parents or staff have a concern about. Height/Weight: Schools no longer routinely measure student's height and weight. I can do height, weight, and body mass index measurements at parent request.

MEDICATION: Any medication at school requires a School Medication Form signed by the parent and be in the original container (no baggies). For prescription medication, the form must also be signed by the physician. Please contact me if you have questions or need assistance.

MORE INFORMATION: I will occasionally post information on our district website. You can find me under the "schools" tab at "News from Our School Nurse". Dr. Elizabeth Hanson from Gundersen Onalaska Clinic is our district's Medical Advisor and much of the information I post comes from the Gundersen Clinic website. We want our students to be healthy, in school, and ready to learn!







This last year saw the beginning of a new opportunity for Mel-Min students. The high school expanded their Career and Technical Education department to include Business Ed. The business department is teaching a variety of courses to match the various career pathways in business including Intro to Business, Marketing, Accounting, Personal Finance, and Desktop Publishing. The 8th grade Careers class has also moved to the business department to introduce students to career exploration before entering high school. Each of the business classes focuses on giving students opportunities to apply the concepts learned in a hands-on setting including partnering with local business, 4U Custom Apparel and Gifts, last year to help with their rebrand in Marketing, creating business plans and pitching them to a panel of "sharks" in Intro to Business, and designing the yearbook in Desktop Publishing.

Business concepts transcend the classroom through a new student organization that was also added, DECA. DECA allows students to take the concepts learned in the classroom to be practiced and demonstrated through competition. Last year we experienced great success with all seven District competitors moving on to compete in the State competition. In addition to competition, DECA also focuses on providing students the opportunity to serve their community. Last year the DECA chapter made 4 blankets for the Jackson County Humane Society and created 106 military care kits that were mailed overseas to our service men and women.

There are exciting times ahead for the business department as DECA continues to grow and the school store nears it's opening!


Holiday Spirit is Alive & Well at Mel-Min!

ANNUAL NOTICE

HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children and youth as:

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and youth who are:

- sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- living in emergency or transitional shelters
- abandoned in hospitals
- living in a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and migratory children who qualify as homeless because the children are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children or youth who may qualify according to the above criteria, the Melrose-Mindoro School District provides the following assurances to parents and guardians of homeless children and youth and unaccompanied homeless youth:

- The child or youth shall be immediately enrolled and allowed to fully participate in school, even if unable to produce records normally required for enrollment (e.g., academic records, immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, or other documentation) or has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.
- Homeless children and youths are not stigmatized or segregated on the basis of their status as homeless and have full and equal educational and related opportunities.
- Meaningful opportunities to participate in the education of their children including special notices of events, parentteacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.
- Immediate enrollment and transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" means the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled, including a preschool.
- Written explanation of any decisions related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the rights of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to appeal and receive prompt resolution of such decisions.

Academic & Career Planning Kicks Off! Abby Fernan, ACP Advisor & 7-8 Guidance Counselor

The Melrose-Mindoro School District has been revising and expanding the Academic and Career Planning programming at the junior high and high school levels. A team of dedicated staff members have been meeting to ensure that ALL students have essential career exploration opportunities during their educational careers. The ACP team has been reviewing course curriculum and finding ways to embed career development activities into required courses and school-wide experiences.

In the high school teachers have expanded their roles with students in RTI to help students make appropriate course selections for their career interests, facilitate career exploration activities with students, and act as an advisor for students in their RTI groups. Within this advisor role, teachers will begin having guided conversations with students about their career aspirations and education/training plans for after high school.

In the junior high students have been participating in various activities related to academic and career planning. The eighth grade students have already begun participating in transition activities learning about the different high school course offerings and selecting courses for their freshmen year. Both seventh and eighth grade students participated in a career day prior to winter break using the Xello program (career exploration website) to identify careers that match their personal interests and to understand the many values and considerations when selecting a career.
